

## **Enabling Privately Practicing Midwives**

- ✓ The Midwife Professional Indemnity (Commonwealth
  Contribution) Scheme Amendment Bill was passed in Parliament
  in late 2024. This amendment allows for government to cover
  100% cost of claims for eligible midwives who provide labour
  and birth care outside of a hospital setting.
- ✓ The new insurance product is available for eligible endorsed midwives from 1 July 2025.
- ✓ The current PII **exemption** in the *National Law* has been extended until 31st December 2026.
- ✓ The extension allows sufficient time for PPMs to be informed about the new insurance product and make necessary arrangements.





## Designated Registered Nurse Prescriber (DRNP)




- Registration Standard: Endorsement for scheduled medicines designated registered nurse prescriber was officially approved by Health Ministers December 2024
- An endorsed designated registered nurse prescriber will be qualified to administer, obtain, possess, prescribe and supply Schedule 2, 3, 4 and 8 medicines in partnership with an authorised health practitioner under a prescribing agreement
- The Standard and associated guidelines came into effect 30 September 2025.
- The Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council have published accreditation standards, and education providers have commenced development of education programs.
- Set of requirements to meet and maintain endorsement as DRNP
- The measure will enhance access to high-quality, reliable medicines for all Australians.


